To conclude both this AGM and, in a roundabout way, this school year, we are hopeful that you will look back on this year as one of growth, personally and professionally. *The Link* is not always an easy place to work in—especially at this time of year. That being said, *The Link* also offers so many wonderful things to its contributors and masthead members that are hard to replicate anywhere else, and chances are some of the people you will have met during your time at *The Link* will become some of the most important people in your lives.
